Our school building was built in 1922 and the first graduating class was in 1924. This school was originally called Nativity BVM. A few blocks away, St. Stanislaus opened its doors in 1925. For the next 80 years, students who lived in the neighborhood attended Nativity BVM and St. Stanislaus, where they achieved an excellent education and were helped to succeed in their futures. In 2007, St. Stans and Nativity BVM merged to become the now known Divine Mercy Catholic Academy.

The 6th grade teacher, Ms. Victoria Alfano, went to the gala and exclaimed that it was wonderful. She said “Many of DMCA’s teachers were present including former teachers such as Mrs. Langone and Ms. K. They had a cocktail hour as well as dinner and dessert.” According to Ms. Alfano, the food was a delicious Italian meal. Before dinner, there were speeches presented by the honorees (alumni). There was also a speech given by Father Tino and Sister Francis who both attended the Gala. There was a raffle and one of the alumni from St. Stanislaus, who now lives in Pennsylvania, won. AH! IT'S A FIRE!

Do you know about the dangers fire can cause in your everyday life? Well, that is why DMCA had firefighters visit our school to teach us about fire safety and help us see there are things we can do to prevent fires as well. Firefighters came to talk a bit about what we should do if we smell smoke and there is a fire in our house. Some of the younger grades were able to go outside after the fire safety talk to meet with EMTs and look inside an ambulance.

The firefighters stressed you should make sure a smoke detector is installed in your house (or several). This could save your life one day and notify you of a fire you might not be aware of. If you hear the smoke alarm, you should leave the house through your planned exit route. It is suggested to have a safe meeting spot in case you get separated from your family. The meeting spot should be at a safe distance away from your home. For example, a tree near your house; it is to ensure the safety of yourself and everyone. If you and your family are separated, do not go back in and look for them. It is a smarter option to wait for the fire department to come and rescue anyone that is left inside.

Next, never leave the house with candles, stoves, lighters, and even heaters on. Even if you are in the front of your house, a fire could still spread quickly. Candles and heaters could set fires if not put in a safe spot away from all flammable items around your house. When food is on the stove, turn the stove off to prevent burning both the food and your kitchen from burning. Keep all lighters and matches away from the reach of small children, they might think it is a cool toy to play with.

Fires can be scary but they do not have to be... if you have the knowledge on how to handle them/prevent them you will be safe. Students asked the firefighters a lot of questions and were able to get a good understanding of fire safety. Talk about it at home – it can save your life!
